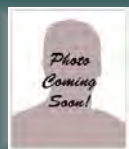
NUMA NEWS LETTERS

TRIBAL TREASURER'S REPORT

SETTLEMENT FUND

As many of us have witnessed over the past few months the stock market has been going up and down, with losses easily exceeding gains currently. The Council has met with our Investment Manager (Cambridge & Associates) regarding the situation and the options that are available to us. Their current recommendation has been to ride out this current turn down in the market the same as happened back in 2007/2008. With that, though, the value of the Settlement Fund at the end of August 2011 was approx. \$50.3 million, but with recent downturn in the Stock Market it is now around \$46.3 million. The Council is closing monitoring the situation to protect these tribal funds and is working to schedule a meeting with its investment manager regarding the economic situation, as well as protecting the minor's trust fund accounts.

NATURAL RESOURCES BILLING

The Finance Department has reconciled the natural/tribal resources accounts which has not been done for a while and are now billing out the statement to the customers for these amounts. If you have

any questions or if you have documentation to support a payment that is not listed on your statement, please call Denea Moyle-Zulz, Accountant, or Lynn Castro, for more information.

2010 TRIBAL AUDIT

The field work for the 2010 audit is complete and we are currently on track to submit the audit to the Federal Clearinghouse by September 30, 2011. On September 27, 2011, the CFO Group presented the 2010 Audit to the Business Council which showed significant improvement of prior year audits. The Council accepted the audit and it is now being finalized for submittal. Based on this, the Tribe is now current and no longer delinquent in its audits.

TRIBAL FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the first time in a number of years, the Finance Department has begun issuing monthly financial statements for all tribal departments/programs showing their expenses in relation to their approved budgets. These statements will be provided to the departments and programs on or around the 15th day of the

GOING SOLAR

Clean Path Renewables from Reno, NV has been installing solar panels for the Tribal departments. They have already completed Fox Peak and are currently working on various departments including the Environmental Department.

The Administration Building and the Arsenic Treatment Plant have already switched to solar. This is all at no charge to the tribe due to the project being funded by Nevada's rebate system and administered by NV Energy. Nevada's Renewables Portfolio Standards (RPS) requires all utilities in the state to get at least 25 percent of the power from renewable sources by 2025.

This is a great opportunity for our state with consistent sunshine, perfectly suitable for solar power. Some of the benefits of solar energy are that it does not produce greenhouse gases; it is renewable energy so it does not consume resources permanently, has very low maintenance which means it's a huge money saver, and saves money on the electricity bills. Solar energy works like this; the sun emits heat (energy) onto Earth. The solar panels absorb



the energy which makes DC current then gets converted into an AC current, kind of like a battery. By the end of the project, the Tribes departments will have 348 Kyocera 235 watt panels. The Environmental Department itself will have 100% cost covered energy depending on many factors like weather and season.

VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

following reporting month. The statements will be available to the tribal membership usually within a few working days after this distribution to tribal programs/departments and they will also be available online at the Tribe's website.

EARLY MINOR PER CAPITA DISTRIBUTIONS

For those parents/guardians that were approved by the Council for *Extraordinary Distributions*, please remember to submit either the original or a copy of your receipts with your child's name listed on each paper, within 30 days after receiving

these funds. Failure to submit these receipts is a violation of the Agreements signed and can be used in determinations future distributions. Please submit your receipts to Miranda Chappell, Accounting Clerk, in the Finance Department.

JUDICIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

TRIBAL JUVENILE COURT

Juvenile cases involve tribal youth natives who are under the age of 18. Juveniles have many of the same rights as an adult in a criminal case, plus some additional protections. Juvenile cases are heard in private closed court sessions. The Fallon Tribal Juvenile Court is held twice a month or every other Monday.

The Juvenile Court is still functioning under the FY 2008 Juvenile Accountability Discretionary Grant Program. The Juvenile Court has been very successful on Reclaiming Youth at Risk who are in the Court system. The Tribal Juvenile Court tries to address the needs of the Youth. Specifically, we will address four ecological hazards in the lives of the youth at risk. These are:

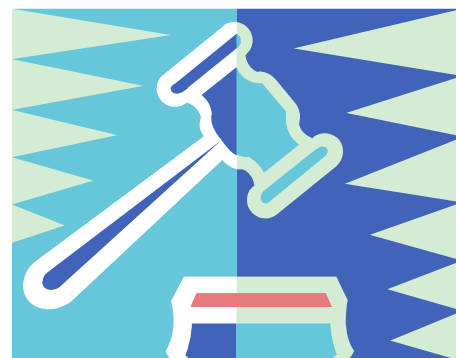
- **Destructive Relationships**, as experienced by the rejected or unclaimed child, hungry for love but unable to trust, expecting to be hurt again.
- **Climate of Futility**, as encountered by the insecure youngster, crippled by feelings of inadequacy and a fear of failure.
- **Learned Irresponsibility**, as seen in the youth whose sense of powerlessness may be asked by indifference of defiant, rebellious behavior.
- **Loss or Purpose**, as portrayed by a generation of self-centered youth, desperately searching for meaning in a world of confusing values.

The Tribal Juvenile Court will continue to hold court and continue to monitor the youth who are in the Judicial System.

TRIBAL DRUG COURT

The Tribal Drug Court has been operational since the middle of 2009. The court program diverts individuals from the Criminal Court system and places them in an intensive program involving treatment, supervision and counseling. The Drug Court Team is staffed by the Judge, Prosecutor, Police Officer, Probation Officer, Substance Abuse Counselor, Drug Court Coordinator, Defense Advocate, and two members from the Tribal Community. The Team's goal is to move the participant away from their propensity towards substance abuse and criminal behavior.

The program requires each participant to complete four separate phases culminating in graduation in about a year. The participant is elevated to each phase after completing a list of specific participation requirements; for example, drug testing 3-5 times per week, two counseling sessions per week community service, complete abstinence and court appearances every two weeks. Any failure in the participant's meeting the requirements meets with a specific sanction, whether it is a letter of apology, short jail terms or termination from the program and their return to the Criminal Court for disposition of their original criminal



charge. Of course, our goal is to graduate each participant from the program with a record of abstinence and pro social accomplishments.

TRIBAL PROBATION

The Probation Office is part of the Judicial Branch of the tribe. Probation is sentence imposed by the Court for a person that either plead guilty to an offense, or was found guilty to a charge so that they can be released in the community while under strict supervision by a person designated by the Court called a "Probation Officer". Probation by the Court is not considered a right, but a privilege granted by the Court. It gives offenders a chance to prove one's self to the community that they can live by the standards of the community as established by their Tribal Law and Order Codes.

FALLON TRIBAL COURT

The Fallon Tribal Court decides all civil, criminal and traffic court that occur on the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribal Indian Reservation or Colony.

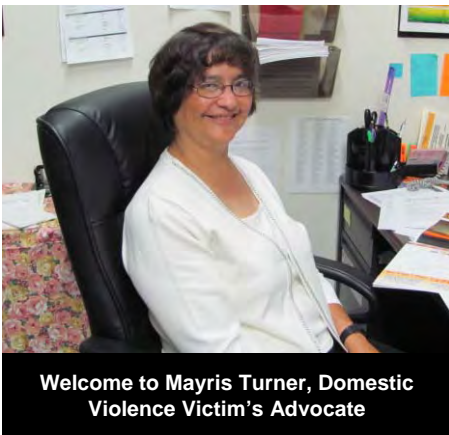

Domestic Violence is EVERYBODY'S Business

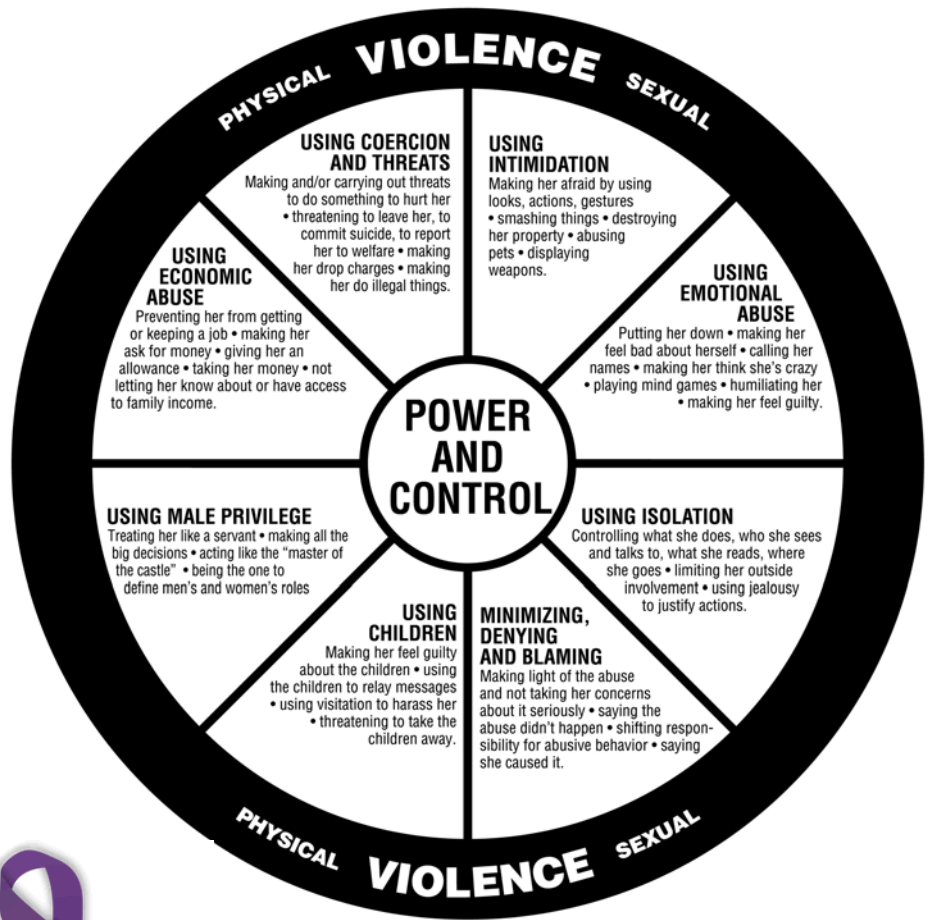

- **CIVIL COURT:** Some cases involve non-Indians depending on the case. Civil cases involve members of the tribe or property associated with the tribe, its members or residents. Examples of civil cases are divorce, custody, or housing matters. Anyone can file a civil case if they have sufficient interest in the case. You have a right to have a lawyer, or advocate, represent you in a civil case at your

own expense. An advocate is sometimes called a representative. You may also represent yourself in front of the court.

- **CRIMINAL COURT/TRAFFIC COURT:** There are two ways you may be brought before the court in a criminal case. You may be issued a citation by a tribal police officer or arrested. If you are ticketed, you may appear before the court on the day and time written on the ticket.

If you do not appear, a warrant may be issued for your arrest. You may be arrested for a criminal offense or if there is a warrant for your arrest that has been issued by the Tribal Court. If you committed a crime in the presence of a police officer, if the police officer has a probable cause to believe you have committed a crime, or if an individual from the community has witnessed you committing a crime and signed a statement against you.

STEPPING STONES EMERGENCY YOUTH SHELTER

What is Stepping Stones? Is it a detention center? Is it for bad kids? Is it for Fallon tribal members only? Are the clients placed in Stepping Stones because of their behavior? Many community members have asked these types of questions so we thought we would give you an overview of Stepping Stones for your better understanding.

So what is Stepping Stones? Stepping Stones is a youth facility that provides a safe home environment for youth ages 13-18. The mission of Stepping Stones is to ensure the effective and efficient delivery of quality residential care for youth within the defined service area (all Nevada Tribes). The purpose of Stepping Stones is to provide emergency residence, counseling, case planning and treatment recommendations and provide follow-up services that are available, accessible and acceptable to the clientele.

Stepping Stones employs three full-time core staff: a **Facility Manager**, who is responsible for the development of programs, operation and maintenance of the facility; a **Program Supervisor**, who provides varied, complex and confidential office administrative, supervisory and professional duties; a **Case Manager**, who coordinates, supervises, and assesses the needs of youth including but not limited to education, employment, social behavior, training, counseling, care and control, promoting a safe healthy environment by introducing self-help skills. The direct service staff are **Youth Technicians** who are employed full-time. There are currently 6 Youth Technicians employed. Youth technicians are scheduled to cover 24 hours, 7 days a week. A Cook/

Housekeeper is employed to ensure nutrition is delivered to the youth and appropriate upkeep of the facility maintained. The Director of the facility is the Social Services Director, who is also the Social Worker for the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe.

Upon placement at Stepping Stones all youth are given physical examinations including vision, hearing and dental. We ensure that their mental health issues are addressed through services at the Fallon Tribal Health Clinic. A treatment plan is developed to address identified needs of the individual youth. The clients in the facility follow a schedule which gives them a daily routine. They are given life skills, social skills, prevention activities, physical fitness activities, culture and education every week in the shelter. The youth are encouraged to participate in their spiritual or religious practices. We focus on life skills with the youth we serve so that when they leave our facility, they can take these skills with them to help them succeed in their future.

Stepping Stones has incorporated culture in our daily activities in order for our clients to maintain the connection with their traditions. We

have participated in many tribal events that the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe along with surrounding tribes have sponsored which include; Pow-Wow's, crafts nights, language classes, sweats, community dinners, elder events and storytelling.

The clients that are placed in Stepping Stones are wards of their respective courts and under Social Services and/or probation. We do get clients who have behavioral issues, however, this is not the main reason they are placed in the facility. Behavior issues accompany substance abuse problems, family issues, abuse, neglect, and also past life experiences that our clients have gone through. Stepping Stones is not a detention center, nor is it a treatment center. Clients are housed at Stepping Stones for different periods of times, depending on their case plans.

The youth remain at Stepping Stones for a number of reasons, including but not limited to, no home to go to, awaiting treatment and parents working their respective case plans. So while those youth are in our care, we aspire to provide them a homelike atmosphere that allows them not only opportunities to succeed, but to also challenge them to address their individual issues.

TRIBAL RESOURCES – AGRICULTURE

Tribal Resources is in full swing--cutting and baling hay for the department, as well as, other tribal members. A work requisition must be submitted by those who may need our agricultural services. The form is available at Tribal Resources, 8820 Mission Road. If no one is in the office, the forms are located inside the porch next to the front doorway. We cut/baled 119 tons of hay for the 1st cutting. Currently, we are in our

2nd cutting, baling approximately 221 1-ton bales; and, in turn, the one-ton bales are being sold to a local dairy.

TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT

Is working on the Indian Reservations Roads High Priority Project in implementing road construction on Reservation Road, between Mission/Agency Roads. At this time, I am looking forward to beginning the overlay project in late February 2012. This project includes the total reconstruction of one culvert and one bridge. This will require road closures to repair and reconstruct each. There will be more information in the near future when this project is underway.

PER CAPITA DISTRIBUTION 2011

The Membership Services Office is currently updating membership address changes for the upcoming Per Capita distribution for 2011. All address changes must be submitted in writing, hand delivered or post marked no later than November 21, 2011, to the Membership Services Office.

The Preliminary Listing for the Per Capita Distribution will be reviewed and certified by the Enrollment Committee on or about November 1, 2011. HERE IS WHY:

- ◆ *There are not enough Native homes for children who have been removed because their parents are temporarily unable to care for them.*
- ◆ *We believe children should maintain their cultural ties to the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe Community.*
- ◆ *We know how vital it is to be part of a family and the value of good parenting.*
- ◆ *We want to take part in restoring the Circles of Care for the Native American Community by promoting self respect, fortify Cultural identity for our children, and strengthen parent child relationships.*

Traditionally, Native American people have cared for their children through extended families. It's very common for Grandparents, Aunties and Uncles to care for one another's children in an hour of need. Becoming a foster parent is another way to carry on this tradition by keeping values and Tribal history alive for our future generation.

Becoming a foster parent is a big decision. The Foster Care process begins with a sincere aspiration to help children in need. After the

decision to become a foster parent the following tasks need to be completed,

- *Meet with the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe Youth and Family Services Foster Licensing worker to review the application process.*
- *Complete the application and background check.*
- *Provide five references from people you know.*
- *Complete a home study.*
- *Complete Foster Care Training.*
- *Complete a home safety check.*

If you live in a home by yourself or with a family of your own, a parent, a grandparent, an auntie or an uncle, you already have everything you need to become a foster parent to a child who needs a family whether short or long term.

The Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe Youth and Family Services will help you in getting the services needed to take care of a foster child. Foster Parents do receive some financial assistance to help pay for the children's expenses while they are in the Foster Homes Care.
