One New Council Member and Two Incumbents Sworn Into Office

On October 1, 2016 members of the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe went to the polls to cast their vote for Chairman, Secretary and one Council Member.

The voting took place at the FPST Tribal Gymnasium beginning at 7:00am and closing at 5:00pm. After the polls closed, the Tribal Election Committee took an hour and a half break and resumed at 6:30pm in an open public meeting to begin the counting of the ballots process. Once the TEC had hand counted all the absentee ballots and the results were added to the in-person ballots, the TEC closed their meeting and handed all the results over to the Fallon Business Council. The FBC opened their meeting and read the results to the public: Alvin Moyle received 145 votes, Len George 129 votes, Laura Ijames 127, Ermert Nihoa 123, both Natalie Pacheco and Donna Cossette receiving 133

votes. According to Title 14, both Cossette and Pacheco tied and therefore had to draw cards, highest card wins, with Pacheco winning the tie breaker. Thereafter, the Tribal Election Committee certified the results of the 2016 General Election.

In accordance with Title 14, a challenge period must first pass before the new Council members can be sworn in to office. Those who were able to challenge the Election are a current candidate who is challenging the results of the election or an eligible voter whose rights have been denied. All challenges had to be submitted no later than 7 days after the election day. Since two challenges were filed by the dead-

line, there was an Election Challenge Hearing held on October 14, 2016 with Honorable Judge Gorman presiding. Candidate Len George challenged the residency of Alvin Moyle and Ermert Nihoa had multiple challenges, which the judge stated he would only address what is relevant to the 2016 Election process. Upon completion of the 2016 Election Hearing, Judge Gorman ruled that George's challenge had merit as Mr. Moyle testified that he did not live at the address that was submitted as part of his filing for candidacy forms, and it was declared Len George would be the candidate who will be sworn in to the Chairman's Office.

Len George, Laura Ijames, and Natalie Pacheco were sworn into office during a special public meeting by Vice-Chairman Yvonne Mori on Tuesday, October 18, 2016, each will serve four year terms.

NOVEMBER 2016 REPORT

PER CAPITA, TRIBAL BUDGETS, AND POINTS OF INTEREST

With the end of the year rapidly approaching, there are a number of items going in relating to the annual per capita distribution, the Tribe's 2017 budget, and the Tribe's various holiday events. This report will touch a many of issues that will be arising as well as other items that we continue to address. 2016 Per Capita Distribution

At this point we are still awaiting the final official third quarter results for the Settlement Fund to make the determination on the per capita amount, as well as the funding percentage that will be used with the various funding categories.

I am anticipating to finalize the numbers in mid to late-November and that per capita checks will be tentatively mailed out around December 8th or 9th (subject to any change or unforeseen circumstances). We are trying to avoid having per capita checks mailed out around the same time as the Tribe's annual Christmas Dinner.

One of the most important notices though is that tribal members need to make sure that their address is correct with the Tribe's

Membership Services/Enrollment Office. The address that is on file with them is the address we will mail check out to so please make sure that this is still correct.

Also please remember that checks may take up to 5 days to be delivered by the U.S. Postal Service due to the holiday season and/or the location where you live. We do not process replacement checks for at least the one week period following the checks being mailed out in order to allow the Post Office time to deliver them.

Budget Committee



The Fallon Business Council will hold a Tribal Budget Session meeting on November 7, 2016 at 5:30 p.m. to do a preliminary review of the budgets and to gather input from the membership on budgets.

TRIBAL DONATIONS & SPONSORSHIP INFORMATION - AMOUNTS AND DEADLINES

Guidelines. Donations are done on a bimonthly basis and requested amounts must fall into the appropriate monetary limits (the deadlines for submitting requests and the monetary limited are provided below) - the deadline though does not apply to emergency purpose requests. Donations & Sponsorship Request forms are available at the Tribal Administration and must be turned into the Tribal Secretary's Office by the "Request Due Date" or it will be acted upon at the next designated date.

Amounts/Limits. The amounts listed below represent the maximum an individual or organization can receive in a calendar year (January to December). Individuals or organizations may submit more than one request per year but cannot receive more than then the total maximum amounts listed below per calendar year.

- Individuals¹ \$250
- Organizations \$500
(involves non-majority FPST members)
- Organizations \$600
(involves majority FPST members)
- Tribal Teams \$700
(use of tribal name/seal required)

¹ The amount of total individual donations provided to an activity in which more than one person submits a request cannot exceed the total amount permitted for organizations. In situations where the Tribe receives individual requests for the same event/activity, the amount approved cannot exceed the maximum organizational amounts and the amount given will be divided up between the applicants.

³ Date of Council action is subject to change based on adjustments to meeting dates and times of the Council. The Council reserves the right to table requests as needed and/or to request additional information.

PLEASE NOTE THE DEADLINES ABOVE AND PLAN YOUR REQUEST ACCORDINGLY. THE TRIBE IS UNABLE TO ACT ON REQUESTS OUTSIDE OF THESE TIMEFRAMES EXCEPT FOR EMERGENCY SITUATIONS.

TRIBAL SENIOR EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

DEADLINES & SUBMITTALS

There are no specific deadlines to submit an application - they are available from the Tribe's Social Services Department.

PURPOSE OF PROGRAM

The purpose of this fund is to assist Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe members who are 60 years of age or older with costs associated with an unforeseen health, safety, or home repair which would result in a tribal elder being without the necessities needed to maintain a healthy home environment or healthy quality of life.

RESTRICTIONS/LIMITATIONS.

1. Recipients are limited to one (1) request per calendar year (January – December).
2. In rare situations where the immediate health and safety of an elder is at stake, the Council may consider an additional request in a calendar year. The elder or representative must attach supporting documentation showing immediate health and safety issues.
3. The elder emergency assistance program is not designed to pay for:
 - a. Ongoing regular payments but rather to assist an elder with an immediate dire situation and is typically a non-regular event;
 - b. Reoccurring personal debts, or debts owed that the individual should anticipate or be expected to pay (e.g., house payments/rent, cable TV bills, court fines, child support, other forms of court-ordered restitution, credit card payments, car payments or other auto related costs, loan payments, etc.).
 - c. Any monies owed to the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe and/or its programs/ departments (e.g., water, natural resources, housing, etc.).
4. If an individual has any delinquent account with the Tribe or owes money to the Tribe, he or she may not be eligible for emergency assistance. The Council, though, may waive this provision for situations involving emergency need and travel.

MEDICAL CLINIC HIGHLIGHTS. The Fallon Tribal Health Clinic strives to provide quality health care for the Fallon Paiute Shoshone community. It is with this goal in mind that several changes in procedures have been initiated.

APPOINTMENTS:

ARRIVE EARLY. At least 30-minutes prior to your medical appointment. NEW patients should arrive 45 minutes early.

If patients are 10 minutes or more late for their medical appointment, they will be re-scheduled.

WALK-IN REQUESTS. Two hours each day will be left un-appointed. Walk-In requests will be prioritized by Medical staff. Please check with the Medical Receptionist for Walk-In status **BEFORE** you complete Patient Registration.

PURPOSE OF APPOINTMENT. Clinic staff will contact patients to confirm/verify the nature of the appointment. Please state if you need a medication refill. To reduce the "Wait Time" of other patients waiting to see the same Provider, the appointment will address only the confirmed nature of the visit. Other topics will be addressed at future visits. This will help the Provider remain on-time with all scheduled visits, thereby reducing time spent waiting for an appointment with a Provider.

PATIENT REGISTRATION

A reminder to patients: Please remember to update your personal demographic information at Patient Registration at every visit to the Fallon Tribal Health Center. **Notify Patient Registration of any changes.**

Changes include:

ANY change in your insurances. Please provide current copy of insurances.

ANY change in insurance eligibility.

ANY change in your residential address, and phone number. Patient Registration will verify your date of birth document, driver's license or state ID, your Social Security card, and tribal ID card.

MEDICATIONS:

Do you need a medication refill? Please read the label on your medication. It will state the amount of **REFILLS** remaining. If the label states 1 of 4, you have refills remaining and you may get a refill. If the label states this is 4 of 4, you **CANNOT GET A REFILL**. You will need to make an appointment with your Provider for a **RENEWAL ON YOUR MEDICATION** before you can receive more medication. Please monitor your medications, do not wait until you are out of medication to request more.

Your friendly Pharmacy staff is here to provide accurate and knowledgeable services. They are happy to help you with any medication questions you may have. If you need refills please call Kent, Laura, or Tyrone at 423-3634 at least 24-hours in advance.

Human papilloma virus (HPV)

Sexually transmitted HPV infections are common and often asymptomatic, untreated cases in women are the main cause of cervical cancer

- ▶ A sexually transmitted virus that causes cancer
- ▶ More than 100 types of HPV have been found so far
- ▶ 15 have been identified as putting women at high risk for cervical cancer

Cervical cancer

1 Virus in cervix enters cells through micro-abrasions

Infests cells

2 HPV replicates

90 percent of cases heal within two years

What is HPV?

The most common sexually transmitted infection. HPV is a different virus than HIV or HSV (herpes). There are many different types of HPV. Some types can cause health problems including genital warts and cancers. BUT there are vaccines that can stop these health problems from happening.

How is HPV spread?

You can get HPV by having oral, vaginal, or anal sex with someone who has the virus. It is most commonly spread during vaginal or anal sex. HPV can be passed even when an infected person has no symptoms.

How to avoid HPV and the health problems it can cause

- 1. Get Vaccinated:** HPV vaccines are safe and effective for both male and females.
 - All boys and girls ages 11 or 12 years and up should be vaccinated. The vaccine is given in three (3) injections over a six (6) month period.
- 2. What health problems are related to HPV?**
 - Genital Warts:** About 360,000 people in the United States get genital warts each year.
 - Cervical Cancer:** More than 11,000 women in the United States get cervical cancer each year.







9 Fascinating Facts about National Parks

Founded on August 25, 1916, the National Park Service has protected America's soaring mountain ranges, verdant forests, and sprawling deserts for an entire century. Full of natural wonders and rare wildlife, the National Parks offer a respite from civilization, serving as a backyard for all of America. In honor of 100 years of stewardship of America's most precious natural monuments here are 9 fascinating facts about the National Parks.

- They cover 3.4 percent of the United States. Spanning 27 states, America's 58 National Parks blanket an amazing 84.6 million acres of American soil. That's a full 3.4 percent of the United States. The largest, St. Elias National Park, takes up a vast 8.3 million acres in South Central Alaska. But not all of the National Parks are so massive. In fact, the smallest, Hot Springs in Arkansas, covers a mere 5500 acres.
- Sequoia National Park is home to the largest tree in the world ... Sequoia National Park in California is home to General Sherman, the largest known tree in the world. While General Sherman isn't the tallest or the oldest tree on Earth, at 52,500 cubic feet in volume, it is the largest. To put its size in perspective, an Olympic sized swimming pool has a volume of 88,500 cubic feet—that means General Sherman is a little over half the size of a swimming pool. At a mere 2000 years old, however, it's just reaching middle age. Scientists say it's still growing.
- Mammoth Cave National Park has the longest known cave system in the world. With 400 miles of caves, the appropriately named Mammoth Cave National Park in Kentucky is home to the longest known cave system on Earth. Several species of bats have been known to live in the caves, as well as cave salamanders, crickets, and two types of eyeless cave fish, which live in the underwater depths of the caves.
- You can sled down the tallest sand dune in North America. In Colorado's Great Sand Dunes National Park, visitors can not only view the highest sand dune in North America, they can sled down it. Called the Star Dune, the giant 755 foot dune is perfect for adrenaline junkies with a need for speed. Great Sand Dunes National Park allows visitors to race down all its dunes on custom made sand boards and sleds.
- Yellowstone has its own flower. Along the shores of Yellowstone Lake in Wyoming's Yellowstone National Park, a flower grows that can't be found anywhere else on Earth. The Yellowstone sand verbena grows on a mere 1.48 acres of the park. Its presence in Yellowstone is surprising not only for its uniqueness, but because other types of verbena usually grow in much warmer climates. Hot Springs National Park started out as a spa.
- Today, the steamy spring waters near Hot Springs, Arkansas, are part of the National Parks system. But even before Hot Springs National Park was founded in 1921, the area had a rich history as a spa town. It was first designated as a recreational location by the United States government in 1832, long before the National Parks existed, and for hundreds of years, Americans bathed in the hot springs waters that flow from the slopes of Hot Springs Mountain, believing the warm waters to have medicinal and therapeutic properties.
- Dry Tortugas is the most remote national park. Seventy miles from Key West, Florida, Dry Tortugas National Park can only be reached by boat or airplane. Most of the 100-square-mile park is open water, though it also encompasses seven tiny islands. Known for its amazing scuba diving and snorkeling, the park features hundreds of shipwrecks visitors can explore. It's also home to five species of sea turtle.
- Mesa Verde National Park protects 5000 archaeological sites. Mesa Verde National Park in Colorado is the largest archaeological preserve in the United States, with thousands of archaeological sites. These include 600 cliff dwellings, where the Ancestral Pueblo people lived thousands of years ago.
- The most visited park is Great Smoky Mountains. While all of the National Parks are full of breathtaking views and amazing historical monuments, Great Smoky Mountains National Park—which straddles the border between North Carolina and Tennessee—seems to be the most popular. Last year, it had more guests than any other park, attracting 307.2 million visits.

Accountant

Under the general direction performs para professionals and technical work involved in executing and supporting accounting and financial management work; performs other related work as required; must have a High School Diploma or GED equivalent supplemented by specialized training and education in accounting and financial management, two (2) year degree preferred in business accounting, financial management; three (3) years of responsible and difficult bookkeeping or statistical record keeping experience, and advanced level computerized accounting and financial management systems work, at least one of which shall have been directly related to assigned areas of specialization, preferably with a municipal government or public agency. Must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing, employees authorized to drive employer vehicle must possess a current valid Nevada driver's license and acceptable driving record as determined by the Tribe's insurance company. Preference given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. Pays \$15.32 – \$18.30/hourly, closes October 31, 2016.

Physician / Pediatrician Generalist

As a part of a multi-disciplinary team of healthcare providers under the leadership of the Associate Director, the Pediatric physician works to achieve organizational goals of the Fallon Tribal Health Center through delivery of primary care services at a patient-centered environment. The staff physician works in a collaborative effort across all departments to remove barriers for accessing healthcare. The staff physician must incorporate health center policies (including quality assurance) into their clinical practice to provide quality care commensurate with training and licensure. Position also provides oversight of clinical support staff (i.e., Midlevel Practitioners, Medical Assistants and Nursing staff) and handles clinical issues to ensure continuity of services and a smooth patient flow. Delivers care appro-

priate for an outpatient, primary care community health center with multicultural, multilingual patient population; must have graduated from an approved school of medicine is required; must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing, employees authorized to drive employer vehicle must possess a current valid Nevada driver's license and acceptable driving record as determined by the Tribe's insurance company. Youth Technician

Community Health Representative

This position is responsible for providing community health and in-home health services to the elderly, disabled and other eligible patients that cannot provide for themselves. The CHR Program endeavors

to provide quality outreach health care services and health promotion/disease prevention services to American Indians and Alaska Natives within the communities of Fallon. Must have a High School or GED equivalent, have knowledge of HIPPA, a current CPR and First Aid Certification or willing to be certified; able to work with Indian people on an individual or group basis. Must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing, employees authorized to drive employer vehicle must possess a current valid Nevada driver's license and acceptable driving record as determined by the Tribe's insurance company. Preference given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. This is a full-time position, pays \$12.10 – \$14.44/hourly, open till filled.

Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP)

The Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) is responsible for performing advance practice sessions within the scope of his/her license and training. Provides services consistent with the stated goals of assisting community members to maintain or increase their level of health by various medical practices or routines; maintains confidentiality of all privileged information. Must have a Master's Degree in Advanced Practice Nursing, preferably Family Practice, current license (RN and APN) to practice as an Advance Practice Nurse in the State of Nevada and certification as an Advance Practice Nurse from ANA or ANC certification agencies are required; or equivalent combination of education and experience; must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing. Preference given to qualified Tribal applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. Pays \$41.86 – \$63.31/hourly, open till filled.

Police Officer

Performs general Police duties and other related duties as required, requires Nevada Post Cat 1 certification, High School Diploma or GED equivalent Tribal paid medical benefits, retirement plan and paid vacation. Must have valid Nevada driver's license and be insurable through the Tribe, must successfully pass a background check and pre-employment drug and alcohol screen. Preference will be given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. Pays \$21.85/hourly, open till filled.

Education Director

The Education Director is the management position for the Tribe's primary, secondary, and post-secondary education program and various youth services programs. This position manages and directs all department staff towards its primary objectives, confers with and advises Tribal leadership concerning the development, implementation and evaluation of current and long range goals and objectives; provides guidance, direction and authorization to carry out major plans and procedures in accordance with Tribal policies and procedures. Reviews operating results of the programs, compares them to established objectives and takes steps to ensure that appropriate measures are taken to correct unsatisfactory results. Must have a Bachelor's Degree in education or business administration or related field and at least two (2) years working experience in either or both fields, two (2) years' experience managing grants, or demonstrate the ability to write successful grants and supervising staff. Tribal paid medical benefits, retirement plan and paid vacation. Must have valid Nevada driver's license and be insurable through the Tribe, must successfully pass a background check and pre-employment drug and alcohol screen. Preference will be given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. Pays \$21.85 – \$26.08/hourly, closes August 8, 2016.

Benefits Coordinator/Patient Registration Clerk

Responsible for obtaining accurate patient records by interviewing patients to obtain identifying, demographic and insurance information for input into RPMS system. Ensures accurate identification and verification of alternate resources data on all patients at the time of their initial access into the Tribal health system with on-going updates during subsequent visits, must have a High School Diploma or GED equivalent and at least one (1) years' experience in a medical office (either in-patient or out-patient) facility is preferred. Must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing, employees authorized to drive employer vehicle must possess a current valid Nevada driver's license and acceptable driving record as determined by the Tribe's insurance company. Must have valid Nevada driver's license and be insurable through the Tribe, must successfully pass a background check and pre-employment drug and alcohol screen. Preference will be given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. This is a part-time position, pays \$10.13 – \$12.10/hourly, open till filled.

Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor

Position utilizes considerable knowledge of medical aspects of disabilities, the behavioral and social sciences, and formal training in counseling techniques to assist individuals in achieving employment. Counselor addresses the interrelated issues of disabilities and their social and emotional impact on individual clients to assist clients in attaining an enhanced understanding of themselves in relation to their disabilities, environment, and employment opportunities; must have an AA in Human Services or related field with two (2) years working with people with disabilities required, Bachelor's Degree with a major in rehabilitation counseling or related field. Tribal paid medical benefits, retirement plan and paid vacation. Must have valid Nevada driver's license and be insurable through the Tribe, must successfully pass a

background check and pre-employment drug and alcohol screen. Preference will be given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR. Pays \$16.26 - \$19.41/hourly, open till filled.

Physical Fitness Trainer




