
The Fallon Cantaloupe and Country Fair, Nevada's longest running agricultural event celebrated its 32nd year in the Lahontan Valley with plenty to do over the 3 day weekend. The festival ran from Friday, September 2 to Monday, September 5.

Opening ceremonies began on Friday and offered live band entertainment. There was an arts and crafts fair with competitions such as

amateur photography, quilt, craft and hobbies, knitting and crocheting, needlework, sewing, home arts and furnishing, food preservation, foot and nutrition, fruits and vegetables, flowers and plants. There was delicious food and the famous hearts of gold cantaloupe. FALLON PAIUTE-SHOSHONE TRIBE

Resolution No. 16-F-173

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE FALLON PAIUTE-SHOSHONE TRIBE, THE FALLON BUSINESS COUNCIL, THAT:

WHEREAS: the Fallon Business Council is the recognized Governing Body of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe ("Tribe") and was established to exercise the privileges and powers of self-government, to conserve and develop the Tribe's resources for the social and economic well-being of its members, and to preserve and protect the civil rights of its members; and

WHEREAS: the Tribe is federally recognized by the United States Government and the Secretary of the Interior as a Native American tribe, and by the powers vested in the Tribal Constitution and Bylaws the Business Council has the authority to enter into contracts and administer any funds within the control of the Tribe; and

WHEREAS: the Business Council previously passed Resolution No. 16-F-119 approving the Tribe entering into an agreement with Green Rooster 2, LLC to establish medical marijuana growing and sales facilities on Tribal lands; and

WHEREAS: the Business Council on September 20, 2016, met with the Nevada United States Attorney and his staff, and learned that the local U.S. Attorney office and local FBI office plan to continue to vigorously enforce federal marijuana laws despite the pronouncements by the U.S. Department of Justice in the Cole and Wilkinson Memorandums and their obligations to meet with and work with the Tribe on a government-to-government basis on any action by the Tribe to establish medical marijuana businesses; and

WHEREAS: the Nevada United States Attorney and members of his staff informed the Council that the Tribe cannot operate a medical marijuana business on federal lands which includes any lands belonging to the Tribe or that it would risk the possible initiation of criminal actions under Federal law against the Tribe, its officers, employees and/or contractors, and he would take action to have detrimental impacts on Federal grants received by the Tribe; and

WHEREAS: the Business Council has determined that the risks are too great to continue to plan for and to implement medical marijuana growing and sales facilities on Tribal lands;

Walking Group - Get moving more throughout the day and come walk in the gym. It has air conditioning and always a great temperature.

Family Fitness & Sports - All age groups are invited to participate. We will do a work out in an obstacle course or circuit training type format. We will be using fun equipment for example: jump ropes, balancing domes, agility rings and ladders, medicine balls, hopper balls, potato sacks and more. Then we will play a fun family friendly sport which would be less competitive examples would include: beach ball volleyball, t ball or whiffle ball, kick ball and etc.



MEDICAL CLINIC HIGHLIGHTS

The Fallon Tribal Health Clinic strives to provide quality health care for the Fallon Paiute Shoshone community. It is with this goal in mind that several changes in procedures have been initiated.

APPOINTMENTS:

ARRIVE EARLY. At least 30-minutes prior to your medical appointment. NEW patients should arrive 45 minutes early. If patients are 10 minutes or more late for their medical appointment, they will be re-scheduled.

WALK-IN REQUESTS. Two hours each day will be left un-appointed. Walk-In requests will be prioritized by Medical staff. Check with the Medical Receptionist for Walk-In status **BEFORE** you complete Patient Registration.

PURPOSE OF APPOINTMENT. Clinic staff will contact patients to confirm/verify the nature of the appointment. Please state if you need a medication refill. To reduce the “Wait Time” of other patients waiting to see the same Provider, the appointment will address only the confirmed nature of the visit. Other topics will be addressed at future visits. This will help the Provider remain on-time with all scheduled visits, thereby reducing time spent waiting for an appointment with a Provider.

MEDICATION:

MEDICATIONS. Do you need a medication refill? Please read the label on your medication. It will state the amount of **REFILLS** remaining. If the label states 1 of 4, you have refills remaining and you may get a refill. If the label states this is 4 of 4, you CANNOT GET A REFILL. You will need to make an appointment with your Provider for a **RENEWAL ON YOUR MEDICATION** before you can receive more medication. Please monitor your medications, do not wait until you are out of medication to request more.

Your friendly Pharmacy staff is here to provide accurate and knowledgeable services. They are happy to help you with any medication questions you may have. If you need refills please call at least 24-hours in advance and ask for Kent, Laura, or Tyrone.

PATIENT REGISTRATION

A reminder to patients: Please remember to update your personal demographic information at Patient Registration at **every** visit to the Fallon Tribal Health Center. **Notify Patient Registration of any changes.**

Changes include:

ANY change in your insurances. Please provide a current copy of insurances.

ANY change in insurance eligibility.


ANY change in your residential address, and phone number. Patient Registration will verify your date of birth document, driver’s license or state ID, your Social Security card, and tribal ID card.

Nutrition tips for healthy eating, tips to increase your physical activity and motivation to help you achieve your healthy weight goal, INCENTIVES for a healthier you!

Both “walks” will be closely monitored. The first 150 people to register for either race will receive an athletic shirt for their participation. Water, and fresh fruit will be available at the finish of each walk. Registration for the walks begins at 7:30 A.M. at Churchill County Fairgrounds. Walks begin at 8:30 A.M.

Fitness for \$10 VIP+ Program participants: You are minded that you are REQUIRED to attend the facility at least three (3) times a month or you will be dropped from the program. The new owners are charging the Diabetes Program the monthly fee whether you attend or not.

BIG 5 Sporting Goods: Remember, you must be in compliance with Diabetes Program requirements in order to receive athletic shoes. This includes Medical, Dental, Nutrition and Optical appointments, and labs must be current.

Lunch & Learn Program: These are held every 3rd Tuesday of the month at the FTHC Conference Room from 12 Noon to 1:00 P.M. A different topic is presented each month and a healthy lunch is served.

Improving Your Clinic Experience

- Arrive for any appointment at least 30-minutes early. If you are a new, first time patient, or moving back into this area, please arrive 1-hour early. This allows sufficient time for completing the Patient Registration process before your appointment.
- If you have small children and you have an appointment at the Health Center, please make child care arrangements prior to keeping your appointment at the Health Center. Clinic staff must assist other patients and may not “watch” your children.
- Please monitor your prescriptions so that you do not run out. If you are on your last refill, you need to make an appointment with your provider to renew your prescription.
- Clinic staff may need to contact you regarding your appointment, please keep your contact information current. If your telephone number, mailing address and/or emergency contact information has changed, please notify PATIENT REGISTRATION as soon as you can.
- Food and beverages are not allowed in the Health Center. Lunch & Learns for the Diabetes Program are an exception.

BUG OF THE MONTH: INFLUENZA VIRUS (FLU)

We are once again entering FLU season. FLU is a contagious disease that occurs every year between October and May. It is caused by influenza viruses, and is spread mainly by coughing, sneezing, and close contact.

Anyone can get the FLU. Flu strikes suddenly and can last several days. FLU symptoms include sudden onset of fever/chills, cough, sore throat, muscle aches, runny or stuffy nose, headache, and fatigue.

Flu is more dangerous for some people. Infants and young children, people 65 years of age and older, pregnant women and people with certain health conditions or a weakened immune system are at greatest risk. FLU vaccines can:

- Keep you from getting FLU
- Make FLU less severe if you do get it, and
- Keep you from spreading FLU to your family and other people.

Everyone 6 months and older should get the flu vaccine by the end of October, if possible. FLU Vaccines are available now at the Fallon Tribal Health Center, between the hours of 1:00 P.M. and 4:00 P.M. You do not need an appointment.

You are encouraged to take preventive actions to stop the spread of germs. 1) Wash hands often with soap and water, 2) Cover nose and mouth with a tissue when you sneeze or cough, or if you are at the clinic, use a protective mask, 3) Try to avoid contact with those that have the FLU, or if you have the FLU avoid contact with those at high risk.

If you have the FLU, 1) Rest and drink plenty of fluids, 2) see your Provider if you are at high risk for complications, 3) If your Provider prescribes them, antiviral drugs work best within 2 days of getting sick, 4) Antiviral drugs make the illness milder and shorten the time you are sick.

Be Proactive....Get your FLU shot.





****Important Notice to Taxpayers from IRS: Please Read****

**New Federal Tax Law May Affect Some Refunds Filed in Early 2017;
IRS to Share Details Widely with Taxpayers Starting This Summer**

The Internal Revenue Service has announced initial plans for processing tax returns involving the Earned Income Tax Credit and Additional Child Tax Credit during the opening weeks of the 2017 filing season. The IRS is sharing the information now to help the tax community prepare for the 2017 season, and plans are being made for a wider communication effort this summer and fall to alert taxpayers about the changes that will affect some early filers.

This action is driven by the Protecting Americans from Tax Hikes Act of 2015 (PATH Act) that was enacted Dec. 18, 2015, and made several changes to the tax law to benefit taxpayers and their families. Section 201 of this new law mandates that no credit or refund for an overpayment for a taxable year shall be made to a taxpayer before Feb. 15 if the taxpayer claimed the Earned Income Tax Credit or Additional Child Tax Credit on the return.

This change begins Jan. 1, 2017, and may affect some returns filed early in 2017. Additional information is listed below.

To comply with the law, the IRS will hold the refunds on EITC and ACTC-related returns until Feb. 15. This allows additional time to help prevent revenue lost due to identity theft and refund fraud related to fabricated wages and withholdings.

The IRS will hold the entire refund. Under the new law, the IRS cannot release the part of the refund that is not associated with the EITC and ACTC.

Taxpayers should file as they normally do, and tax return preparers should also submit returns as they normally do.

The IRS will begin accepting and processing tax returns once the filing season begins, as we do every year. That will not change.

The IRS still expects to issue most refunds in less than 21 days, though IRS will hold refunds for EITC and ACTC-related tax returns filed early in 2017 until Feb. 15 and then begin issuing them.

This is one more step the IRS is taking to ensure taxpayers receive the refund they are owed. The IRS plans to work closely with stakeholders and IRS partners to help the public understand this process before they file their tax returns and ensure a smooth transition for this important law change.

More information about this law will be posted to IRS.gov and shared with partners and taxpayers throughout the second half of 2016.

~TAX DEPARTMENT NEWS~

The Tax Department will no longer be able to access the Online Taxwise Software used to process all Tax Returns after November 9th. If you need copies of your tax returns, please come by the office prior to that date. After November 9th you will have to request all prior year tax returns through www.irs.gov. We are using new Tax preparation software for the upcoming 2016 Tax Season. 





TRAUMA AND ITS IMPACT ON CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS

This is part 3 of a three-part education series from the Indian Country Child Trauma Center at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center, www.icctc.org.

The following is an excerpt from *What is Trauma? A Guide for Parents Indian Country Child Trauma Center*. “Trauma is an emotional or physical reaction to an event that is witnessed or experienced by a child or adolescent and is disturbing to them.”

When should I get help for myself?

If you are feeling overwhelmed dealing with your child’s reactions, you may want to talk to your child’s physician, a family member, close friend, community elder, or other helpers like a mental health professional. When you do not know what to do, it is best to ask for help from someone who works with children or has experience dealing with exposure to trauma. It can be helpful to talk to your child’s teachers, counselors, coaches, or other youth helpers as they can assist you to build a supportive network for your child.

Things you can do to help your child...

- Let your child talk about what happened if he wants to; do not ask a lot of questions and do not keep bringing it up.
- Assure your child that many children feel sad or upset when a traumatic event happens to them.
- Tell your child that, “It’s okay to feel a little scared. I’m here if you want to talk and I’ll try to help you feel better.”
- “A lot has happened. Is there anything you’re worried about or that I can help you better understand?”
- “I will be here when you want to talk about what happened. It is important that you talk about it. If you would rather talk to a counselor, I will find one for you to talk to.”
- Pay attention to your child’s moods and behaviors. Encourage them to talk about why they are feeling sad, angry, mad, happy, etc.
- Give your child extra hugs, even your teen. Younger children may need extra cuddling and rocking.
- Support your child’s wishes if he wants to talk to a traditional or ceremonial elder or healer, a member of an organized church, or a mental health professional.
- Encourage your child to draw a picture or write a story about what happened and then ask them to tell you about it.
- Read your child a book each night.
- Encourage your child or teen to make plans for future activities and events.

EMPLOYMENT

Youth Technician

Accepting applications for full-time Youth Technician, working with youths 13-18 years old, following established guidelines and promoting therapeutic growth; must be 21, be able to work with youth. Must have a High School Diploma or GED equivalent, and must pass a background check and pre-employment and on-going random drug testing, employees authorized to drive employer vehicle must possess a current valid Nevada driver's license and acceptable driving record as determined by the Tribe's insurance company. Preference given to qualified Native American applicants in accordance with 25 CFR, pays \$11.40 – \$13.61/hourly, open till filled.

Senior Accountant

Under general direction performs and participates in planning and organizing responsible professional accounting and financial management work, must have knowledge of principles and practices of general, fund and governmental accounting, including financial reporting and financial statement preparation; principles of budget development and administration; auditing practices and methods; applicable federal, state and local laws; computerized financial systems. Front Desk Receptionist – Health Center

Tribal Health Center Front Desk Receptionist will provide efficient, helpful information for the patients and the clinical staff within accepted professional standards and practices. The Front Desk Receptionist will be responsible for telephone inquiries and effective flow of patients to and from the clinical areas. Assist administration and programs administratively. Education Director

The Education Director is the management position for the Tribe's primary, secondary, and post-secondary education program and various youth services programs. This position manages and directs all department staff towards its primary objectives, confers with and advises Tribal leadership concerning the development, implementation and evaluation of current and long range goals and objectives; provides guidance, direction and authorization to carry out

major plans and procedures in accordance with Tribal policies and procedures. 


