I am also working with other tribal committees on filling all vacancies and working with committee to ensure committee meeting minutes are completed. The committees that still have vacancies are Law & Order, Education, Health, Cultural, Enrollment, Natural Resources and TERO.

Attended the National Congress American Indians Summer Conference. Many issues for Native Americans were address by the NCAI. This organization assists tribal representative to protect and keep tribal councils informed on important issues that effect tribal entities. Protecting our rights, traditional laws, cultures, and improving quality of life for all Native communities; such as health issues, housing, taxation, sovereignty, bills before Congress, and updates on the Cobell litigation, etc. By attending National Conferences at this level enhances tribal councils ability to be current on issues and lobbying for the betterment of tribes. Meeting other tribes and political officials of high stature that are actively participating in governmental issues is an important asset to our tribe.


SETTLEMENT FUND QUARTERLY MEETING

Restrictions/Limitations.

1. Recipients are limited to one (1) request per year, except in rare situations where the immediate health and safety of an elder is at stake. The elder emergency assistance program is not designed to pay for ongoing regular payments but rather to assist an elder with an immediate dire situation and is typically a non-regular event.
2. If an individual has any delinquent account with the Tribe or owes money to the Tribe, he or she may not be eligible for emergency assistance. The

**ABSENTEE BALLOT
 REQUESTS**

The Tribal Election Committee is now accepting Absentee Ballot Requests for the upcoming 2014 Regular Election.

Pursuant to the Title 14-Election Ordinance, 14-110-030(b), all requests shall be in writing and notarized by a Notary Public and submitted to the TEC by mail, fax, or hand delivery. All requests for an absentee ballot must be received no later than **seven (7) days** prior to an election. The use of the Absentee Ballot Request Form No. TEF-005 is optional, but other formats/forms must adhere to Title 14 requirements.

Tribal Constitution Article IV, Section 3:

Any eligible voter who provides written notice to the Election Committee may vote by absentee ballot as provided in this Section at an election of the Tribe, if he/she is or expects to be:

- (a) Absent from the reservation/colony because of the nature of his/her vocation, business, or any other unavoidable causes;
- (b) Unable to go to the polling place due to unavoidable causes;
- (c) Enrolled and attending an educational institution; or
- (d) In any branch of the armed forces of the United States of America.

Deadline to submit Forms to the TEC:

Saturday, September 27, 2014

- In any branch of the armed forces of the United States of America

UNAVOIDABLE CAUSES: Medical conditions that prohibit making it to the polling place, weather conditions that would hinder a person to safely travel to the polling place, travel/vacation plans that would remove a voter from the Reservation/Colony, or eligible voters who reside outside the exterior boundaries of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe.

All the requests for an absentee ballot that use the reasons of unavoidable causes shall be subject to review by the TEC for consideration and approval. The decision of the TEC shall be final.

Submit this form to the TEC by mail, fax or hand deliver. All Absentee Ballot Requests must be received by the TEC no later than seven (7) days prior to an election - requests received after this time period will be considered invalid. All requests MUST be notarized by a notary public.

By my signature I swear that my request for an absentee ballot is valid with the Constitution and Title 14 of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe.

The label provides valuable information on the number of refills remaining! Keep in mind the pharmacy can refill no sooner than 27 days from your last refill and 28 days for controlled substance.

REFILL INFORMATION

1. We can't refill medications earlier than 27 days from your last fill. (28 days for controlled substances)
2. This means no refills left because 1-1=0 This means 9 refills left because 10-1=9
3. The order expires in 1 year (12 months) from the date on your **FIRST** bottle, NOT date on refill bottles.
4. Don't use after this date.

Prevention Perspectives



WHEN THUNDER ROARS, GO INDOORS!

Summer is the peak season for one of the nation's deadliest weather phenomena—lightning. In the United States, an average of 66 people are killed each year by lightning. In 2005, there were 43 confirmed deaths and 172 confirmed injuries. As of October 1,

there were 44 confirmed lightning deaths in 2006. The injury number is likely far lower than it should be because many people do not seek help or doctors do not record it as a lightning injury.

People struck by lightning suffer from a variety of long-term, debilitating symptoms, including memory loss, attention deficits, sleep disorders, numbness, dizziness, stiffness in joints, irritability, fatigue, weakness, muscle spasms, depression, and an inability to sit for long.

Lightning causes about \$5 billion of economic impact in the United States each year.

Lightning kills about 100 people per year and injures about 1,000 in the United States each year. Lightning is the #2 weather killer in the United States killing more people than tornados and hurricanes combined—only flood kill more.

Lightning is a serious danger. The best thing you can do to avoid lightning danger is to learn and practice lightning safety.

No place outside is safe in a thunder storm.

The "30-30 Rule" offers the best lightning safety guidance for the general public. When you see the lightning count the

time until you hear the thunder. If the time is 30 seconds or less, the thunder storm is close enough to be dangerous - seek shelter.

You should wait 30 minutes or more after the lightning flash before leaving your shelter.

A house or other fully enclosed structure offers the best protection against lightning. Stay away from telephones, electrical appliances, and plumbing. Don't watch the lightning from a window or doorway, inner rooms are generally safer.

A car with a metal roof and sides is your second best protection against lightning. As in a house don't touch any conducting paths leading outside. It is the metal shield that protects you not the rubber tires.

If you are caught outside in the woods take shelter under short trees. If you are boating or swimming, get to land and find shelter immediately! Protect yourself outside. Go to a low-lying, open place away from trees, poles, or metal objects. Make sure the place you pick is not subject to flooding.

Be a very small target. Squat low to the ground. Place your hands on your knees with your head between them. Make yourself the smallest target possible. Do not lie flat on the ground -- this will make you a larger target!

People struck by lightning carry no electrical charge and can be handled safely. Call for help. Get someone to dial 9-1-1 or your local Emergency Medical Services (EMS) number. The injured person has received an electrical shock and may be burned, both where they were struck and where the electricity left their body. Check for burns in both places. Give first aid. If breathing has stopped, begin rescue breathing. If the heart has stopped beating, a trained person should give CPR.

Energy Tips

No Cost Tips

These simple steps don't cost a thing, but can potentially save you 10-25% on your monthly energy bill.

- Turn off lights and appliances when not in use. Don't forget your computer. Most new computers have sleep settings.
- In the cold months, set the thermostat to 68 degrees when home, and then back to 55 - 68 degrees when unoccupied.
- In the winter, open window coverings on the sunny side of your home to take advantage of free heat from the sun. Close the coverings on cloudy days or right after the sun sets.
- In warm months, set the thermostat to 78-80 degrees when home and 5 to 10 degrees warmer at night or when you're not home.
- In the cooling season, close blinds and drapes during the day to keep heat out.
- Also, use your dishwasher, clothes washer and dryer, and cook as late in the evening as possible.
- Barbecue outdoors when practical, keeping in mind the heat and effect of sun on your body. Reducing the heat coming into your home from any source, such as cooking, will reduce the load on your air conditioning.
- Use pool trippers to reduce the time your swimming pool pump runs--eight to twelve hours a day is plenty.
- Set your water heater to 120 degrees.
- Close foundation vents in the winter months.
- Vacuum your refrigerator coils (underneath and in the back) and don't obstruct the coils. They need air space to work.
- Dress according to the weather.
- Keep the seals (gaskets) on refrigerators and freezers clean.
- Keep your freezer as full as possible. You can place containers or plastic bottles filled with water in the empty spaces.
- Make sure food is cool and covered before it goes into the refrigerator.
- Run full loads in your washer and dryer, and use "solar drying" (clotheslines).
- Use energy saver option on your dishwasher, allowing dishes to air dry.
- If your A/C unit is on the ground, keep the area around it clean and free of obstructions to maintain air flow.
- Unplug your televisions/DVD/DVR when you're on vacation. Most new sets draw power even when they're turned off.
- Keep lights and lighting fixtures clean, especially if you're reducing the number of lights you use. Dirt absorbs light. Let lights cool before cleaning them and never touch halogen bulbs with your bare hands. The oil from your skin can greatly damage the bulbs. Use a small piece of paper to hold the bulb.
- If your dishwasher has a filter, keep it clean.
- Clean the reflectors underneath the burners on stovetops.





What's Growing On In The Hoop House?

Clients in the Horticultural Therapy Project have done a great job planting and taking care of the hoop house and adjoining raised beds located at the Administration building. The resulting spring garden has yielded carrots, lettuce, beets, Swiss chard, onions, spinach and cucumbers and it is not done yet. There are a lot of tomato and cucumber plants doing well and some of the raised beds are being cleared now for a second sowing of other vegetable seeds.



Many people think the time to plant a garden has long since passed, but actually July and early August are great months for planting a fall garden. Certain crops, such as carrots, arugula, beans, beets, lettuce, spinach & broccoli do great now because the hot days make germination a snap and there is no competition for the seedlings from weeds because they have already sprouted and been cleared from the garden.

Even in a drought year like we are experiencing now vegetables can be grown on drip systems, hand watered or grown in pots so the gardener can make sure not one precious drop of water is wasted.




