

The Tribe is looking to appoint two (2) Tribal Election Committee (TEC) Members to serve until the new TEC is appointed in March. These vacancies are due to resignations and will serve through March 31, 2020. If you are interested, fill out a Committee Appointment Form no later than February 10, 2020. The Council will appoint two (2) members at the Regular Council Meeting on February 11, 2020. Each committee member will be compensated during the election period and the appointment process at an hourly rate of \$13.00/hour and at all other times a stipend will be paid.

The Cultural Committee Bylaws that were presented to the Council and approved on November 26, 2019, by Resolution 19-F-191, were rescinded at the Regular Council Meeting on January 28th. Therefore, this committee is again placed on hold.

The Higher Education Advisory Committee has one vacancy. The appointment will be a two-year term through January 31, 2022. Also, after March 31, 2020, there will be two (2) vacancies on the Enrollment Committee.

I want to welcome the newly appointed committee members. Natalie Pacheco, Vicki Moyle, Tamika FastHorse, Jacquelyn Allen, and Jody Baldwin to the Tribal Employment Rights Ordinance Commission; Brenda Hicks to the Stillwater Tribal Senior Committee; and Fred Hicks, Jr., Letisha Yellowhawk, and Chris Campbell to the Land & Water Resources Committee.

On behalf of the Council, we thank all the past and present committee members for your service to your Tribal membership and community. The committees serve in an advisory capacity to the Council. Your input as a committee is valuable so that the Council has a better understanding of the technical aspects and priorities of each program needs. Committee recommendations assist the Council to make sound decisions.

The Council has been actively holding land working group meetings to review and revise the Land Ordinance to assess the Tribe's need, and to better serve all Tribal members. This process is tasking as it will entail a soils analysis and review of the location of Tribal lands. For those Tribal members that have applied for a land assignment we have one small lot on the Colony that is available at this time.

To all current land assignment holders, in accordance with the Constitution and Bylaws: *Article VII Land, Section 2. If any member of the Tribe holding an assignment of tribal land shall, for a period of two years, fail to use the land so assigned or use such land for any unlawful purpose, his assignment may be cancelled by the Business Council, after due notice and an opportunity to be heard, and such lands may be reassigned...* Be advised the importance to make good use of your land assignment, and be in compliance with the Tribe's Constitution and Bylaws and Ordinance No. VII - Standard Homesite Assignments.

Save 680,000 Acres of Public Access! Oppose Military Takeover of our Fallon Wildlife

The 116th Congress will decide the future of 680,000 acres of wildlands in Northern Nevada, an area of over 1,000 square miles—the size of the State of Rhode Island. The U.S. Navy proposes to **quadruple the size of existing Naval Air Station Fallon (NAS Fallon)** to envelop vital wildlife habitat and treasured scenic, recreational and cultural landscapes for war training activities.

The military's proposal would damage important Tribal cultural sites and end long standing public use of these land, including traditional practices by local Tribes that have persisted for at least 10,000 years. This is unacceptable. Congress must preserve public access and Tribal use of these wildlands by rejecting the Navy's proposal to close off additional public lands for war training. Congress must not accept the Navy's massive land grab at the Fallon National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) and diverse neighboring ecosystems. The Navy must consult with Tribal governments and perform a full inventory of cultural resources before an expansion of the existing NAS Fallon is considered. Congress must listen to the voices of Nevada and Tribal governments. I encourage all Tribal members to be active in any public meetings, write to our Congressman, and share your comments on social media. We need to stand united nationally to oppose the Navy's proposal.

The question is often asked by program directors and tribal members, “Why are we charging indirect costs because that takes away from services?”

25 CFR Section 1000.2

Indirect costs means costs incurred for a common or joint purpose benefiting more than one program and that are not readily assignable to individual programs.

25 CFR Section 1000.4(c)

(6) It is the policy of the Secretary to afford Tribes and Tribal Consortia the maximum flexibility and discretion necessary to meet the needs of their communities consistent with their diverse demographic, geographic, economic, cultural, health, social, religious, and institutional needs. These policies are designed to facilitate and encourage Tribes and Tribal Consortia to participate in the planning, conduct, and administration of those Federal programs, included, or eligible for inclusion in an annual funding agreement.

Section 1000 grants authority to the Council to charge indirect cost. The authority does not tell tribes how to administer or implement indirect costs. That decision is left up to the

individual tribal councils throughout the nation when they negotiate with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. As a side note, the concept of indirect cost was one of the critical factors in the Ramaha Supreme Court Decision. Part of the Supreme Court’s ruling in Ramaha was that all costs including indirect costs must be considered.

When I was researching this question of indirect cost I was told the most understandable answer lies in educating people about the “process”. Consider the process for installing a fire hydrant in front of your house.

The Fire Chief identifies the need for a fire hydrant.

The Grants Department writes a grant application.

The Council approves submitting the grant application.

The Council votes to accept the conditions of the grant award.

The Public Works Department writes an RFP to hire a contractor.

The Finance Department creates an account for the grant award.

The Contract Team selects the contractor.

The Project Manager monitors the contractor installing the hydrant.

The Tribal Tax Department charges the contractor for tribal business

license and tribal sales tax.

The Project Manager issues a final inspection notice for the hydrant installation.

Finance issues checks for the final payment to the contractor.

The Grant Compliance Coordinator, the Public Works Director and the Project Manager write the grant completion report to the funding agency.

The Grant Compliance Coordinator, the Public Works Director and the Grants Accountant write the final grant expense report to the funding agency.

The question now becomes, who pays the salary for the Fire Chief, the Grants Department, the Council, the Public Works Department, the Finance Department and the Project Manager? Who pays for the electricity and heat in the Tribal Administration Building where the employees work? Who pays for the Police Officer who patrols each night to insure the Administration Building is there in the morning? Etcetera. The answer is the indirect cost pool. If the Tribe did not have the indirect cost pool for these people and services, the only other source is the Settlement Fund.

The Eagle Has Landed

40 years ago, bald eagles were on the brink of extinction and although they are no longer on the endangered species list, both bald and golden eagles are still protected, under multiple federal laws and regulations. Eagles, their feathers, as well as nest and roost sites are all protected. Last year I heard about the bald eagle migration in the Carson Valley from December to February, as it becomes a winter migrating stop off for dozens of bald eagles because of the cattle.

This year, I packed up my binoculars and camera and headed over to Carson Valley just south of Reno, about an hour drive. I pulled over and parked off State Route 88 near a ranch, as ranchers were feeding their cattle. About 50 yards off, a newborn calf lay still next to its

mother, as a bald eagle swooped down nearby, where there was plen-

tiful afterbirth produced by the calving season. It wasn't long before the curious calf spotted the eagle eating breakfast. As he approached the raptor, obviously ignorant and unaware of the danger, he found himself face to face with the majestic symbol of our nations greatness. But in no time the eagle marched off and then took flight to find a place where his meal would be less disturbed.

This amazing valley drains the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada Mountains and offers habitat for wildlife. One of my favorite animals is the American bald eagle, I believe partly because of my love for this country. This is a great place to visit and capture a picture of the beautiful birds and other wildlife.



January 1st, 2020, the FPST Vocational Rehabilitation Program was awarded a new 5-year grant from the Department of Education. The program now begins the process of developing and updating forms used in the program such as the policies and procedures, and contracts. All consumers will need to submit a new application to receive services.

To participate in the VR program, the applicant must:

- 1.) have a documented disability,
- 2.) must be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe, and
- 3.) must live on the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Reservation, Yomba Reservation, or the Lovelock Colony.

If interested, consumers are encouraged to come in to the VR Program, pick up an application and make an appointment with the VR counselor, Hattie Williams.



The Voc. Rehabilitation Program provides individualized services to consumers with disabilities in preparation for their employment based upon their strengths, abilities, capabilities, education and learned experiences.

Two new staff members have joined the VR team. In November 2019, Elaine Bender, became the new Program Manager. She was born and raised in Schurz, Nevada, and is a member of the Walker River Paiute Tribe. Her goal is to provide effective and equitable services for the Vocational Rehabilitation program and it's consumers.

In January 2020, the team also gained Emily Dixon, as Technical Assistant. She was born and raised in Fallon, Nevada and is a member of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe. Her goal is to provide quality assistance for the VR staff members and consumers, in hopes to enhance the program as a whole.



In conclusion, the Vocational Rehabilitation Program is now fully staffed and excited to work with the individuals in our communities!

1.1 Maintenance of 1937 Act Housing

During 2019 the Housing Department had one hundred sixteen (116) work orders for maintaining 1937 Act rental units. The Housing Department renovated eight (8) rental units which were vacant. Maintenance crew painted exteriors of rental units, removed swamp coolers and installed air conditioner units, installed handicap ramps, and completed repairs which were found when inspections were completed on rental units.

2.1 Operations of 1937 Act Housing

The Housing Department employed four (4) administrative staff and eight (8) maintenance staff to carry out the operations, administration, and maintenance of 1937 Act housing. Staff completed inspections, managed work orders in HDS, assisted homebuyers and homeowners with assistance applications, and managed the day to day operations of the housing department. Administrative staff maintained tenant accounts receivables, accounts payables, and emergency requests. Maintenance staff has maintained the holding pond issues in the Ellison and Jensen sub-division for housing units.

3.1 Operations and Maintenance of NAHASDA Units

The Housing Department managed and inspected the NAHASDA units. They provided employment for staff, including maintenance staff to process and complete work orders for NAHASDA units. Administrative staff managed tenant's accounts receivables and compliance. Maintenance Staff corrected garage slope to three (3) units.

3.1 Housing Services – Counseling Program

The Housing Department employed a Resident Services Specialist to be the point of contact for counseling new applicants, existing tenants, homebuyers, and homeowners on programs available to them and on compliance. RSS assisted applicants with filling out and providing the required documentation to determine eligibility for housing. RSS also assisted the elderly and disabled homebuyers and homeowners with completing applications for the emergency assistance program. RSS explained eligible activities for emergency assistance, verified documentation through a 3rd party. RSS provided counseling services and conducted training presentations. RSS conducted move-in orientations with tenants. RSS was responsible for assuring that all program files were complete and accurate according to the Tribe's Housing policies.

4.1 Amerind Coverage Elderly

The Housing Department assisted thirty-two (32) eligible Elder homeowners by paying for their annual insurance premium through Amerind Risk's Community Shield program. Housing staff assisted Elders with completing applications and taking pictures of their homes to send to Amerind for quoted for each home.

5.1 Emergency Assistance to Elderly and Disabled Homebuyers and Homeowners

The Housing Department assisted one hundred and three (103) Elders with emergency assistance. Assistance included the installation of handicap ramps and handrails, repair and/or replacement of water heaters, ranges, refrigerators, repairs to leaking kitchen and bathroom fixtures, electrical outlet replacements, replacement of smoke alarms and fire extinguishers, installation of secondary heating and more.

6.1 Homebuyers and Homeowners Revolving Home Improvement Loan Program

The Housing Department received eight (8) requests for health and safety assistance from homebuyers and homeowners. This program is for homebuyers and homeowners who do not qualify under the Elderly Emergency Assistance program. The homebuyers and homeowners were assisted by the Housing Department and they entered into a payback agreement for the cost of their needed repairs.

7.1 Assist 80-100% Median Income Families with Renovation Programs

The Housing Department assisted three (3) homebuyers who are 80-100% medium income with household repairs. The homebuyers entered into payback agreements with the Housing Department for the cost of their repairs. The department assisted with furnace repairs, electrical, plumbing repairs, replacement of hot water heaters, appliances.

8.1 Crime and Safety Prevention

The Tribe/Housing Department employed one (1) full time police officer to provide safety for the community residents residing in housing managed units. Tribal Officers participated in community events to meet and greet residents and to talk about safety issues.

9.1 Architect & Engineering Plans

The Housing Department is not ready to move forward with this program.

10.1 Emergency Assistance to Homeless Tribal Members

The Housing Department assisted two (2) Tribal Members with Emergency Assistance for Homeless. The Housing Department paid for security deposit, first and last month rent for the Tribal members who were able to secure rental housing off the reservation.

11.1 Elders Winter Heating Assistance

The Housing Department provided Elder Winter Heating Assistance to thirty-nine (39) Elders. Elders received a one-time assistance with either a cord of wood, 100 gallons stove oil, 100 gallons propane, and a pallet of pellets. Housing department received applications for the program and verified eligibility.

12.1 Demolish 2 Houses

Two (2) houses with foundation failures were demolished and two (2) modular units were purchased and is in the process of getting the site preparation completed for modular to be delivered.

13.1 Rehab/Modernization of 1937 Act CAS Units

The Housing department procured for a contractors to do roofing on seven (7) homes and rain gutters on ninety-five (95) homes. The Housing staff removed and installed siding on two (2) homes, removed and replaced six (6) swamp coolers with air-conditioners, fixed fencing in sub-division, cleaning up weeds in sub-division and installed wood or pellet stoves for secondary heating.

Bighorn Sheep reintroduced To Pyramid Lake Mountain Range

On January 2020, 21 bighorn sheep were released in the Pyramid Lake Mountain Range. It has been 100 or more years since the last herd was seen there. The Nevada Department of Wildlife partnered with the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe as the sheep were captured in Sheep Creek Range near Battle Mountain. Crews shot nets at the sheep from helicopters to catch them. The project is the first of its kind with NDOW working with a tribe.

Desert bighorn sheep, Nevada's state animal, once populated the state in the tens of thousands. But with Western settlement, their populations shrunk with excessive hunting and human encroachment.

Mike Cox with NDOW said, "We have captured and translocated over 4,000 bighorn sheep within Nevada and throughout the Western United States and Canada to help restore the herds. Nevada's population of the sheep is now more than 12,000."

The Tribal Irrigation Water Assignment Form includes; contact information, allotment number(s), number of acres, irrigation lateral number(s), and takeout number(s).

Evelyn Works, Our Eldest Tribal Member

1922. Warren G. Harding is 29th President of the United States, the British Empire rules nearly 25% of the earth. British explorer Howard Carter discovers the Tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamen (King Tut, and Judy Garland, Stan Lee, Betty White, and Evelyn Works all came into the world. Yes, 1922 was quite a year.

Evelyn Works, was born on February 13, 1922. By the time you are reading this Evelyn may have already celebrated her 98th birthday.

Evelyn was born in a small house on the Fallon Reservation. Her father, Harry Dixon, was from Mexico, Her mother Hattie Pete, was from the ancient line of people who came to be known as the Toi-Ticutta, "People of the Marshes". Evelyn's grandmother was Minnie Pete. Her Grandfather, Little Pete, was a leader of our Toi-Ticutta people for many years. What most of us can only read about as history, are times and events Evelyn grew up living. They are an intricate and very real part of her life, and our history. Evelyn gathered these


memories with close family and friends, most of whom are gone now.

Even so, just like most of us, there are certain people who influence our lives in special ways. I asked Evelyn if there was someone in her life she admired or looked up to. After a thoughtful moment, she shared "...there were some missionaries that came to Stillwater..."

"After meeting them, I decided I wanted to go to church with the Indians in Stillwater." But, my family wanted me to go to the Catholic church in town. This would cause a big fight every Sunday. Interestingly though, when Evelyn became an adult she chose to attend the Catholic church after all. She still smiles as she recalls "Evelyn Grace, was the name a Catholic missionary gave me."

Evelyn began attending boarding school in Stewart, Nevada at the early age of 5 years old. She continued there until she finished the 9th grade. She completed her High School education attending Sherman Indian High School in Riverside California. As a result of her educational experiences, her childhood and teenage years were punctuated with a lot of rules and regulations.

Understandably, some of her fondest memories as a child were when she was home in Fallon, with her grandparents. Evelyn remembers riding horses and running errands for her grandparents, since they did not have a car. She smiles brightly when she shares how on her grandparents ranch "...they had chickens, horses and even a couple of pigs..." She remembers going to the movies at the Fallon Theater, she is amazed the theater is still there. A particularly fond memory

is her father taking the time to teach her Spanish.

As she sorts through precious memories she begins to laugh. She chases the pigs around her grandparents home, as she quietly stares into the past. She tells me about the fun of chasing dragon flies, catching them on the wire fence. Her eyebrows rise revealingly as she recalls the excitement of learning to drive her first car, and the day she crashed it into a tree. She remembers how she and her friends would craft make-shift wagons and push them up Rattlesnake Hill and with nervous laughter as they came bumping along down the hill. Evelyn had 9 children, 7 living. She has 4 generations of grandchildren. Thoughtfully she recalls how just as they do today, her family would celebrate birthdays, holidays. Still, many of the traditions she grew up with are very different today. There was a time when most every weekend people would gather on Hicks Road to play 5 cards, hand games, and sing. "That kind of thing doesn't happen very often anymore."

Growing up with strict parents and grandparents, "We were told, don't look at him, he might be your relative".

When I ask Evelyn about her first love, she begins to blush. Her eyes sparkle as she answers "... Oh that was Delbert Cooniff from Stewart." "We started school together and were in the same grade for all those years." She sighs deeply, looking back across the years. "I don't know where he is now, sometimes I think about him and wonder, what ever happen to that Delbert."

Evelyn Works lived in a time when the city dump was where the Fallon Colony is today. Her smile leaves her as she describes how the townspeople would dump their trash right past the bridge next to what today is the Smith Funeral Home, they would dump garbage on both sides of the road, all the way past the colony, past where the Indians lived.

The disrespect shown to Indians by putting the dump next to tribal members homes' isn't the only one of Evelyn's darker memories. She remembers how very angry her mother would get because they were not allowed to eat inside the restaurants in town. Indians had to eat in the alley. Worse yet, Indians couldn't be in town after dark.

Even so, as the years went by, things did improve for Indians and for all other minorities as well. More and more Indians bought cars, and as red skin gave way to green money, eventually, they were allowed to eat inside Fallon's restaurants. But equal rights came slower in other areas. One of these areas was the integration of schools in Fallon. What was camouflaged as a generous gift to Tribal children was actually a mixed blessing. Born of the policies of segregation, our tribal kids weren't allowed to ride to school in the same bus as non-Indian children. All Indian children had to ride to school in the Indian only school bus.

Though there were life's challenges, Evelyn's life, for the most part, was composed of the simplicity of growing up on a reservation in rural Nevada. But, as some events do, Evelyn's life was abruptly filled with experiences that took her far beyond Fallon and boarding school. She was there during a period of history that changed the world forever. The world was at war.

WW II was a global conflict that lasted from 1939 to 1945. No one was untouched by the magnitude of the struggle. Germany conquered Europe and joined with Japan and Italy to form the Axis alliance. Soon America was forced to join in a struggle for freedom that was coming closer and closer to our door steps. Fearing the backlash of public outrage, the government's policy was women were not *officially* to be involved in actual combat. Nonetheless, approximately 400,000 U.S. women served in the armed forces. Many were young women from right here in Fallon. When several of Evelyn's friends joined up, so did Evelyn. Evelyn served in the Woman's Army Corps

(WAC) stationed in Des Moines, Iowa. "The rules and regulations I learned in in Stewart Indian School, had taught me everything I needed to know to make going into the Army easy." Ironically, Stewart used to be an Army Post, before the government converted it to a school for Indians.

Fortunately, Evelyn never saw combat. But nonetheless, "While stationed in Des Moines, they would keep us informed on everything that was happening in the war on a daily basis." We all knew the very real importance of the contribution all of the members of the WAC were making.

After the war, Evelyn returned to her home here in Fallon. As she looks back through the joys and the sorrows, Evelyn is very proud of her humble beginnings. She shares her life's stories with pride and contentment. After having the honor of spending just a few hours with her, I certainly understand why. Evelyn Works, a beautiful, wise, precious, member of our Toi-Ticutta people. We are all very proud of you too. Happy Birthday Evelyn...






