New Food Pantry Opens It's Doors



"The vision is to reduce food insecurity and create pathway to a brighter, more sustainable future. We want to make sure that when people come here, they feel comfortable and welcome. Food distribution at the food pantry is not seen as a handout, but as a resource for our community," said Cathrn Foote, Food Pantry/Community Garden Coordinator.

Finally, community gardens can teach youth about horticulture and where their food comes from. This program is actively involved in building a stronger community food system and supporting food producers in our tribal community.

Cancer Prevention Measures include:

- Be more active; at least 30 minutes of physical activity a day. Walking is good.
- Avoid red meat, processed meats and fried foods (use an air fryer if you have one).
- Eat more fruits and vegetables
- Avoid alcohol and tobacco/nicotine products.
- Stay on top of cancer screenings. Make and keep your appointments.

YOU CAN PREVENT AN OPIOID OVERDOSE DEATH WITH NALOXONE (NARCAN)

-a prescription opioid antagonist that can temporarily reverse the effects of an opioid overdose and prevent death (More than one dose may be necessary to maintain opioid reversal.

- -"Knocks" the opioid off the opiate receptor in the brain
- -No opioids = no effect
- -Not harmful if no opioids in bloodstream
- -Effective usually in 1 to 3 minutes
- -Effects last between 30 to 90 minutes





NARCAN (NALOXONE) NASAL SPRAY

- · Remove naloxone from the box
- · Peel back the tab with the circle at the top right corner to open
- Hold the naloxone with your thumb on the bottom of the plunger and your first and middle fingers on either side of the nozzle
- Tilt the person's head back and provide support under the neck with your hand
- Gently insert the top of the nozzle into one nostril, until your fingers on either side of the nozzle are
 against the bottom of the person's nose.
- Press the plunger firmly to give the dose of the naloxone
- A dose can be given every 2 to 3 minutes until independent breathing begins
- Repeat naloxone administration in the opposite nostril if necessary
- If no response, continue to repeat naloxone administration if available until an ambulance has arrived

NALOXONE SIDE EFFECTS

Includes agitation, nausea, excessive sweating, running/bloody nose, fast heartbeat & high blood pressure

ENSURING HIGHER LEVEL OF CARE

After naloxone administration, the patient should continue to be observed until an ambulance, arrives or transport to a medical facility occurs.

 Update on the Tribes Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program and statistics for tax year 2022.

195 Tax Returns were prepared during 2023, The VITA program prepared Tax Returns for years 2022, 2021, 2020. The VITA program also assisted with tax notices for clients, assisted with printing tax forms, answering tax questions over the phone and in person and assisted with filing extensions.

- Tax Year 2022 Federal Refunds totaled: \$238,140.00
- Total EITC claimed: \$52,999.00
- Total Child Tax Credit Claimed: \$64,668.00
- Members of Federally Recognized Tribes Served: 133
- FPST Tribal Members served: 83

The Tax Department is looking forward to providing this service for the 2023 tax year.

Tax Revenue

The Tribe has so far collected: (Not all November/December payments are reflected)

\$1,903,270.26 Sales Tax Revenue

Sales Tax Revenue is derived from sales of taxable items, collected from all businesses.

Use Tax Revenue \$26,712.30

Use Tax Revenue is derived from materials used on projects on the reservation and from taxable purchases of items for use in a business. The Use Tax Revenue is an increase of about \$20,000.00.

Fallon Tribe helps with School Bus Route Blackouts in Churchill County

The CCSD is no longer meeting all transportation needs due to a bus driver shortage. The district began implementing rolling transportation blackouts beginning in January.

The driver shortage is being felt nationwide. The school district is looking at hiring incentives and other recruitment efforts in hopes of seeing a rise in bus driver applicants.

The Tribe's Community Learning Center Director, Lisa Bedoy was contacted by CCSD about the bus driver shortage. They met several times partnering with CCSD, Churchill County Transportation, Fallon Tribal Transit, FPST Communications and Title 6 to begin exploring options to accommodate the lack of drivers. They created a blackout bus list which is a list of students who need transportation, who are both members of the Boys and Girls Club and/or community members.

CLC staff held a Transportation Blackout Community Meeting where approximately 25 parents, representatives of CCSD, CCTD and the FPST Chairwoman Williams-Tuni had

discussions about the transportation blackout. Ideas, questions, adjusting some schedules, reducing some services and consolidating some stops and car pools were topics of the meeting. During the blackout week, CLC provided 3 vans that picked-up and dropped off students from school.

CLC Director Lisa Bedoy would like to give a shout out to CLC staff Austin Little, Adrian Tom and Leticia Yellowhawk for playing a crucial role in their commitment to our youth and the daily operations to help out during the blackout period. She would like to also like to thank the FPST Transit Department for being on stand by if needed at a moments notice.


Menopause and Heart Health

Heart disease risk rises for everyone as they age, but for women, the years leading up to and after menopause are a critical time to care for their health.

Menopause is a natural phase of life for most women in their 40s or 50s. It's often just called menopause, but menopause actually has three stages:



- 2 MENOPAUSE
- 3 POSTMENOPAUSE



- Key time for a woman to reduce CVD risk factors and care for her heart health
- When a woman's period stops permanently
- 12 months in a row without menstruation

 Many women will spend up to 40% of their lives postmenopausal or "after menopause"



Cardiovascular Risk Factors

Menopause does not cause cardiovascular disease; however, during the menopausal transition, women experience many changes in their bodies, including some that can impact their cardiovascular health:



- Decline in estrogen levels
- Hot flashes and night sweats
- Depression
- Sleep problems
- Increased body fat around the organs
- Increased cholesterol levels
- Stiffening or weakening of the blood vessels

- Increased risk of metabolic syndrome –
 3 or more of:
 - High blood glucose (sugar)
 - Low levels of HDL ("good") cholesterol in the blood
 - High levels of triglycerides in the blood
 - Large waist circumference
 - High blood pressure

The early natural menopause (prior to 45 years of age) and the surgical removal of the ovaries can also increase a woman's risk for cardiovascular disease.

Take Menopause to Heart

Women are at a greater risk for heart disease and stroke after menopause, making it even more important to focus on your health before menopause, and throughout the menopausal transition.



Get plenty of exercise/ physical activity



Quit smoking

How to Recycle Paint



Consumer paint comes in several forms: latex (or water-based), acrylic (water- and chemical-based), and alkyd (or oil-based). It's important to know which type you have because the disposal options are different for each.

The easiest way to avoid contributing to paint waste and pollution is to plan your project and purchase only what you'll need. If you want to keep some touch-up paint for later, seal unused paint carefully and store it in cool, dry location to avoid having rust form on and inside the lid. PaintCare.org offers a video series about how to store paint properly, if you need tips.

Paint Recycling Preparation

- 1. The first step toward successful paint recycling is proper storage. If you have an open can of paint, make sure to keep it covered so the paint doesn't dry up. You can also wrap the lid in plastic to provide an additional seal. Store it in a cool, dry place between uses.
- 2. If you have no more use for half-empty paint cans, see if you can donate them first. For example, many school drama clubs, community theaters, and housing nonprofits will accept used paint.


If your paint came in an aerosol can (regardless of type), visit our aerosol cans recycling guide for disposal tips.

- 1. If reuse is not an option, then it's time to find a recycler or to dispose of it responsibly. Here's where the story differs based on the type of paint you have:
- 2. Oil-based paint is not easily recycled and will typically be accepted by a household hazardous waste (HHW) program or any Paint care-affiliated retailer. If your community doesn't offer HHW collection, you'll want to dry out the paint using kitty litter and/or newspaper and throw it in the trash.
- Acrylic paints, which are fast-drying and generally safe, do not need to be sent to an HHW location. If you do not have local recycling options, dry the paint, adding kitty litter or another absorbent, before taking the landfill.
- For water-based paint, recycling may be an option where you live by taking it to a transfer station. In many cities, latex paint is excluded from HHW collection and special collection events or programs are available. If you must send used latex paint to the dump, dry it first by mixing kitty litter into the paint and allowing it to stand for several days.

Why Recycle Paint

- Water-based paint is the most commonly accepted product at household hazardous waste events nationwide, even though the EPA doesn't consider it to be hazardous waste. Most hazardous waste is incinerated instead of recycled.
- New water-based paint can be made from recycled paint, or mixed together to create new colors used for projects like graffiti removal.

Using 1 gallon of recycled paint instead of new paint saves 100 kilowatt-hours of energy and keeps 115 pounds of carbon dioxide out of the air.









Purpose of VR

Our purpose is to help eligible individuals with disabilities get or keep a job. If you are eligible, our vocational rehabilitation counselor will help you identify a suitable job goal, determine the services needed to become ready for the job, and assist with the employment search. It is important to remember that any services provided must be in support of your job goal.

Together, you and your VR counselor will:

- Assess your strengths, resources, priorities, abilities, capabilities, interests, and rehabilitation needs
- 2. Explore, clarify, and determine your employment and career choices
- 3. Address your disability-related barriers to employment
- Develop and carry out a plan for employment (IPE) that will result in suitable employment
- Maintain contact for at least three months after successful employment


