

In speaking the Northern Paiute language, we greet someone with, "How u?" (How are you?). Answering with, "Besha nuume" (I feel good). Or sometimes not so good, "Ki besha nuume."

"Ki besha nuume" is a signal that our friend needs help.



## What Does Mental Health Problem Mean? Ki Besha Numme.

Mental health problems don't only affect adults. Children, teenagers, and young adults can have mental health problems, too. In fact, 3 out of 4 people with mental health problems showed signs before they were 24 years-old. Everyone goes through tough



times, and no matter how long you have had something on your mind. It's important that you talk to someone about it. Take notice when your young person has changed:

- Changes in appetite or sleep patterns
- Unable to perform daily tasks like going to school
- Don't want to hang out with your friends or family
- Don't want to do things you usually enjoy
- Fight a lot with family or friends
- · Can't control your emotions, and it's affecting your relationships with your family and friends
- Have low or no energy, or feel hopeless
- Feel numb or like nothing matters

#### Self-Care is an act of bravery. Take care of your Mental Health today.

#### Again, talk to your parent, guardian, or a trusted adult if you experience any of these things:

- Can't stop thinking about certain things or traumatic memories
- Often feel confused, forgetful, edgy, angry, upset, worried, or scared
- Want to harm yourself or others
- Have random aches and pains
- Smoke or drink excessively
- Hear voices.

If you have any of these feelings and believe nobody will understand, you are not alone. Have a parent call the Fallon Tribal Behavioral Health Program to schedule an appointment for you. This is the first step in your self-care. Learning more about yourself and finding healthy ways to cope, heal, grow, and recover.


Peer Recovery Support Services (PRSS) at the Fallon Tribal Health Center: What is it?

Peer recovery support service (PRSS) programs across the nation are using the power of lived experience of addiction and recovery to provide opportunities for healing individuals, families, and communities. PRSS programs are building upon the work of early and enduring recovery movements in Native American communities and are helping to foster cultural renewal to heal intergenerational, historical trauma as well as contemporary trauma.

At the Fallon Tribal Health Center, peer support services includes advocating for people in early recovery, serve as a mentor, seek and provide resources and assist on building life skills and goal setting and facilitate Talking Circles.

## EMERGENCY KIT CHECKLIST



Store all your supplies in a plastic tub that is easily accessible.

Water Three gallons of water per person, to last three days, for drinking and hygiene.	Radio  Battery-powered or hand crank radio, preferably a NOAA Weather Radio.
Food At least a three-day supply of nonperishable foods. Don't forget a manual can opener.	Flashlight Don't forget the extra batteries. Consider adding some light sticks.
Prescription Medications  At least a week's worth of medication.  Don't forget non-prescription medications.	First Aid Kit & Dust Mask For any medical needs and to help filter contaminated air.
Cash In case ATMs are unavailable or credit /debit card systems are down.	Whistle & Local Map Use to signal for help and evacuate without GPS if needed.
Important Documents Copies of any documents you can't lose, along with your family emergency plan.	Cell Phone Chargers Include a solar charger and/or fully charged power banks (will need to be recharged).
Kitchen Items Utensils, cups, tupperware, napkins, plastic ties, garbage bags and disinfectant wipes.	Plastic Sheeting & Duct Tape To help shelter-in-place if needed. Also consider nylon rope.
Personal Hygiene Moist towelettes and hand sanitizer. Also, don't forget toothbrushes and toothpaste.	Wrench and Pliers To turn off utilities. Multi-purpose/ multi-functional tool as well.
Blanket & Clothes Keep a spare set of clothes and blankets to keep warm and dry.	Also Consider  Hand warmers, waterproof matches, gloves, pocket knife and fire extinguisher.

### Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribal Employment

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT

Police Officer Trainee-The Police Officer Trainee is entry level Law Enforcement position. Trainees will participate in initial departmental training and orientation programs, including attending an accredited Police Academy. The Police Officer Trainee is a non-sworn position designed specifically and solely for the purpose of employing Police Officer candidates in trainee status during the initial basic police officer academy training. Incumbents will be afforded the opportunity to be appointed to and sworn in as a probationary entry-level police officer with full police authority upon successful and satisfactory completion of academy training.

Salary Range: \$24.55-\$29.31

**Police Officer**-Performs Law Enforcement/Public Safety duties by maintaining order, responding to emergencies, protecting people and property within the Reservation and Colony; enforcing motor vehicle and criminal laws within Tribal codes and Nevada Revised Statues when appropriate; promoting good community relations. If coming from reciprocity state or approved federal program as an equivalent to a Nevada Category I peace officer there are eligibility requirements that will need to be in met. Maintain a working relationship with city, county, state and federal allied agencies.

Salary Range: \$24.56-\$29.31

#### SOCIAL SERVICES

Youth & Family Social Services Director-The Youth & Family Services Director is in charge of administering the Tribe's Social Services Department, which includes general assistance, ICWA, vocational rehabilitation, and other related social service functions, and supervises and directs the work of caseworkers in formulating and carrying out treatment plans or specialized services assignments. Occasional evening and weekend work, such as attendance at meetings, trainings, or other call-out work, may be required as job duties demand. This position will take rotating on-call shifts to ensure social services covlerage during evenings, weekends, and holidays.

#### SENIOR CENTER


